WATER SUPPLY UPDATE

With winter rainfall lower than expected, conservation remains key to keeping our reservoirs ready for the next dry season.

After a wet season last year, we were hoping for another wet winter. But rainfall so far has been below average. Through early February, we received 27.7 inches of rain at Lake Lagunitas, which is about 85% of the average for this date.

During that period, Marin Water's seven reservoirs reached 94.4% of capacity; on average, our reservoirs are about 84% full this time of year. We rely on rainfall captured in our reservoirs as the primary source of our water. Though we are always glad to see the reservoirs filled, as we move into the spring and summer months, we are asking customers to use water wisely. Conservation is key to having an ample supply of water during drier years.

ROSS RESERVOIR LANDSLIDE REPAIR

Scheduled repair work will result in temporary road closures and traffic delays near Ross Reservoir and Phoenix Lake.

Marin Water will soon begin work to stabilize a landslide near Ross Reservoir. Work is slated to begin in mid-April and continue through November, and will occur Monday through Friday. While work is underway, access to some of our watershed trails will be impacted on weekdays, but will remain open on the weekends.

Temporary closures will occur on the fire road from Natalie Coffin Greene Park to Worn Springs Road. Worn Springs Road from Phoenix Lake to Ross Reservoir will be closed during construction. There will be flaggers at key points along the fire road from Natalie Coffin Greene to Worn Springs Road assisting trail users during the intervals between the truck trips. The alternative hiking trail from Natalie Coffin Green to Phoenix Lake will remain open and will not be affected.

Ross Reservoir is a one million-gallon concrete tank that supplies water to 20 percent of Marin Water's customers throughout the greater Ross Valley. To learn more, visit MarinWater.org or for questions about trails near Phoenix Lake, contact our watershed office at 415.945.1180.
