
Water Year Summary

Overview - Water Year 2021

Historic drought conditions

- Statewide: total rainfall over last 12 months is <u>second</u> driest water year since 1895
- More severe than 1976-77 water year







Total Reservoir Storage




Historical Total Reservoir Storage




Upcoming Months


- Forecast 70-80% chance of weak to moderate La Niña

Actual vs. Targeted Water Use





Customer Polling

High Water Users Survey

- They are motivated to reduce outdoor water use further if they knew that doing so would improve neighborhood fire safety and fish and wildlife habitat.
- They say they are most likely to pay attention to enclosures with their water bills and word of mouth.
- Complete survey and focus group findings and will be presented at the Communications and Water Efficiency Committee Meeting – November 17th

Turf Program Informal Survey

- Informal survey to determine opportunities to improve program
 - Locating materials was a challenge

Turf Program Success

- Ridge of San Rafael HOA -Removed 2,300 sqft
- Cape Marin HOA Removed 6,795 sqft
- Internal refinements to clarify tracking progress of applications, preapprovals and completed projects
