Dear official,

I would like to share some of my ideas as to how best to conserve water. Permanent removal of grass lawns, though require watering, have numerous environmental benefits too.

- 1-Turf grass host wide variety of insects that aerate the soil beneath.
- 2-Birds use the grass to hop around to find seeds and catch insects. It's another important source of food to hunt for seeds and organism.

Now, as for better ideas to save water, here are some suggestions:

A- New hotels and resorts apply for building permits should be discouraged from building swimming pools and saunas, be they for adults or children.

B-New hotels, private and community pools, and gyms should be obliged to install automatic excessive shower chimes/alarms or digital timers that gently informs users of the amount of water already spent and time to turn it off.

Mandatory stickers should be placed directly above/beneath shower control knobs with words "Please, save our resources. Save water!", "Please, do your part to save water!", "Saving water is the right thing!", "Saving water is an intelligent choice!", "I pledge to save water!", etc. The stickers have to be designed inexpensive, hard to remove, difficult to write over, and waterproof. They must be attached in direct view wherever a water faucet, knob, shower-head

C-It's still not too late to create a system that rewards or fines businesses based on their water consumption. A maximum amount of water per guest can be calculated, averaged between gallons used during drought and non-drought conditions.

If water is hard to get due to increased high warm temperatures and decreasing water levels, why can't you county officials join forces with other counties and stop just one source of water wastage, the gym showers?

Up and down California, I have personally witnessed incredible amounts of water wasted in private gyms and swimming pools. Just because the members pay large fees, after brief exercises, they abuse the available showers by purposely lingering for tens of minutes.

D-New apartments, condos, and rental properties that offer paid/free (cold) water to renters, should be persuaded to install water saving devices. This is because usually free water means higher likelihood of negligent wastefulness.

E-Water treatment facility is still worth the investment because of prior examples that they work and partially alleviate decreasing water sources.

All the wastewater from pools, lawns, factories, showers, can be treated and recycled, if not for drinking, then to at least irrigate farmlands.

"If there is a will, there is a way." If taxes and human ingenuity are wasted to needlessly get man and materiel to planet Mars and beyond, how difficult is it to design and build several

wastewater treatment plants? The least you could do with treated water is to extinguish wildfires.

Last but not least, fixating on turf grass removal means overlooking the bigger picture. Besides all the above mentioned benefits, the grasses prevent soil erosion. Else, wind blown dust from exposed dry soil would increase a lot more.

Certainly, it is possible to invest in a couple of desalination plants along the Pacific Ocean. The money is there and so is the technology. If dozens of countries such as Spain, Australia, Mexico, Bahrain, Chile, etc. can afford to have desalination plants, some having imported this technology, can't we afford to build a couple in only one state?

Dear President of the Board: I learned of the special meeting of the Board of MMWD late yesterday afternoon, too late to submit comments by the 4:00PM October 14, 2021 deadline imposed in the Notice of Special Meeting/Retreat of the MMWD Board of Directors for receipt of emails by Board members about today's meeting. The notice to the public is inadequate to provide any meaningful chance for the public to comment in advance of the or at the meeting and is not compliant with the public light required to shine on public agency meetings under the Brown Act. The last day also happened to coincide with the final game of the National League Divisions Playoff game between the Los Angeles Dodgers and the San Francisco Giants which must have diminished greatly the number of members of the public who would be able to respond by that inadequately short notice period. I was not able to reply until now as the meeting continues today.

I object to a discussion of the topic greatest concern to all MMWD customers and voters namely the "short term and long terms approaches to managing the District's water supply". The key issue for the public because of the drought restrictions is what the District will do to increase water for MMWD's customers which has been discussed in the Marin IJ, but what counts is what you are planning on doing to improve the water supply for MMWD. There is, however, no staff report on what particular approach or approaches will be discussed at your so-called "retreat", and that is not in my view adequate notice to the public under the Brown Act. If documents are to be discussed at the meeting, they should be provided to the public well in advance of the date and time of the hearing.

The Notice of Special Meeting, dated October 12, 2021, states that there will be no public comment except for items on the agenda. The California Legislature passed and the governor signed AB 361 relating to the Brown Act and public meetings and among other things, it provides additional protections for public comment at agency meetings including the provision for the public to provide comments. The MMWD Board's short term notice of essentially two days before the meeting does not provide adequate notice for the public to receive and respond to issues relating to the meeting on this most critical topic to MMWD customers.

I was a member of the Larkspur City Council for twelve years ending in 2003. Larkspur City Council meetings then and now provide adequate notice to the public to receive staff reports and other relevant documents on the Friday before a Wednesday City Council meeting, and public comment on any subject is also specifically listed in the agenda of each meeting and the public is further invited at the start of each meeting to give any public comments during that portion of the meeting and they are not limited to matters on the agenda of that meeting.

You need to re-notice today's meeting so that Marin residents and MMWD water customers can meaningfully participate in the subject of today's meeting in compliance with Board's duties under the California Brown Act.

Israel signs deal doubling water supply to parched Jordan

Energy minister says agreement underscores Jerusalem's desire for 'good neighborly relations' with Amman; 50 million cubic meters a year to be delivered

Israel formally agreed Tuesday to double the amount of freshwater it provides to neighboring Jordan, one of the world's most water-deficient countries.

The agreement is proof that "we want good neighborly relations," said Karine Elharrar, Israel's minister of infrastructure, energy, and water resources.

Elharrar traveled to Jordan for a signing ceremony between representatives to the Joint Water Committee that manages bilateral water relations. This capped an arrangement first announced in July.

The two countries agreed then that Israel would sell 50 million cubic meters of water a year to Jordan, doubling what it already supplies.

"This represents the largest water sale in the history of the two countries," said Gidon Bromberg, Israel director of the regional environmental group EcoPeace Middle East.

He said that the deal "reflects the growing understanding that the climate crisis

already heavily impacting the region must lead to increased cooperation."

"This is what good neighbors do, in line with Israel's policy of connections with other countries," Foreign Minister Yair Lapid said.

Jordan's cooperation with Israel on water predates their 1994 peace treaty. Israel is also a hot, dry country, but desalination technology has opened opportunities for selling freshwater.

The additional water Israel will provide will come from the Sea of Galilee, said Shaked Eliahu, a spokeswoman for Elharrar.

The water deal comes after bilateral relations had cooled under Israel's former prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu. Naftali Bennett, who took over in June, has made strengthening ties with Amman a priority. In July, Bennett met with King Abdullah II in secret at the crown palace in Amman, in the first summit between the countries' leaders in over three years.

I have just today learned that this laughable proposal to import CCWD water to Marin appears to be moving forward on greased skids. Some initial observations:

Now I live in Richmond, exactly where the noise from construction and operations will directly impact.

I am writing as one of many Point Richmond residents who will be adversely affected by construction related to your proposed pipeline across the Richmond-San Rafael bridge, if that important infrastructure project is not undertaken in a different manner . I strongly agree with our Mayor Tom Butt, who has proposed the following modification of your construction plans:

"The Richmond Pump Station should not be placed in the residential & commercial district vicinity of Castro & Tewksbury. Rather, it and the associated generator set and piping should be installed in the industrial area on the other side of I-580 with the pipeline running along or under Chevron Way between Castro and Marine Streets on Caltrans and/or City of Richmond property. From Marine St., the pipeline could be attached to the soffit of the Scofield Avenue freeway bridge structure and westward outboard to the Bay Trail, rather than buried in it. This would eliminate most of the adverse construction and operational impacts on Richmond residents and businesses, while maintaining bicycle and pedestrian access to Point Molate and the Point San Pablo Harbor."

I can assure you that, on this side of the bridge, there will be mounting opposition to this project, as currently conceived—including active neighborhood lobbying of our city council related to the encroachment permit that you will need from the city of Richmond, and possible litigation.

Wouldn't it be far better for all concerned to modify this pipeline construction plan now, so that its physical impact falls on what Mayor Butt accurately describes as "the industrial side of 1-580," rather than have it disrupt a densely populated, residential neighborhood, with narrow streets, located just across from it?

I am a resident whose driveway is accessed from Castro Street. In the past, westbound commuters caused severe morning congestion by engaging in illegal U turns and other traffic violations. The resulting gridlock on Castro Street between Tewksbury and W. Richmond Avenues trapped residents in their driveways. The problem has been so severe that the Richmond Police Department had to place movable barricades at Tewksbury Avenue and Castro Street to block these vehicles.

This congestion is created by southbound Castro Street motorists proceeding past the I-580 onramp entrance. They then make U turns in the Tewksbury vicinity to access I-580 via the northbound Castro onramp entrance, believing their commute time is reduced. While cashless toll has significantly reduced this problem, Castro Street between Tewksbury and E. Standard Avenues still experiences gridlock as a result of illegal turning and illegal usage of a bus stop.

Tewksbury Avenue was narrowed a couple years ago to facilitate the bike trail, enhancing the occasional backups that sometimes reach Santa Fe Avenue. Failure to factor traffic delays and impediments into the project will be an error. My neighborhood will suffer the brunt of construction noise from this project, and don't need morning traffic jams as well.

Will a comprehensive traffic study of this vicinity be conducted?

I have just today learned that this laughable proposal to import CCWD water to Marin appears to be moving forward on greased skids. Some initial observations:

There is water in Marin, it's just being misallocated.

I lived in Marin for 10 years. Marin, the county that prides itself on water conservation. What happened?

Now I live in Richmond, exactly where the noise from construction and operations will directly impact.

The water comes from somewhere else.

CCWD planned. The wealthy of Marin did not support planning by MMWD? Maybe they should let their estate lawns and golf course lawns die. - 2. Frankly, I am in shock still, trying not to have a heart attack, and not thinking particularly clearly.

I am part Ohlone and Bay Miwok. It's hard to fathom how the Bay Area was populated by my incredibly smart ancestors for 10,000 years without despoiling or desecration. Yet, less than 300 years after taking unceded lands from unrecognized tribes and wasting it, smart and wealthy Marin doesn't have enough water.

Why would ANY resident of Contra Costa try to be "water smart" when Marin is not? California has NO extra water. It's ludicrious for Marin not to manage itself. Try a desal plant if you need more.

This is a complete joke and somebody's pockets are being lined with these contracts. Time will tell. Well, with any luck, people will grab hold of this as related to indigenous rights. Have you yet heard of the lawsuit on behalf of Wild Rice? NOT a joke, not one bit.

I am writing in opposition to the Intertie Project as proposed.

People in Richmond wish that Marin County residents and representatives would please stop treating us with complete disrespect in order to meet your needs and enhance your quality of life. This happened with the Richmond San Rafael bridge when the east bound direction was modified to three lanes, and left the westbound direction with only 2 lanes and **no** breakdown lane. This has left us with significantly congested traffic and increased pollution from idling cars.

Now, Marin County is once again proposing to adversely impact the lives of Richmond residents, and in particular those living in Point Richmond, so that you have water.

I oppose the proposed location of the pumping station. The Richmond Pump Station should not be placed in the residential & commercial district vicinity of Castro & Tewksbury. Rather, it and the associated generator set and piping should be installed in the industrial area on the other side of I-580 with the pipeline running along or under Chevron Way between Castro and Marine Streets on Caltrans and/or City of Richmond property.

From Marine St., the pipeline could be attached to the soffit of the Scofield Avenue freeway bridge structure and westward outboard to the Bay Trail, rather than buried in it. Our family has lived in Point Richmond for twenty five years. I understand the need for Marin to come up with additional water sources. However, I urge the Board of Directors to consider the following regarding the installation of a water pipeline and pump station in

Point Richmond.:

- (1) First, consider whether it is viable to tie into EBMUD's existing 12 inch main at the Stenmark Drive exit from I-580. This may void the need to install a new pipeline from Castro Street with a pump station in Point Richmond.
- (2) Second, if you have to put in a pump station, it should be placed on the industrial side of the highway, not in the vicinity of Castro & Tewksbury.
