



Water Supply Update


Cumulative Precipitation – Lake Lagunitas




Weather Outlook




Total Reservoir Storage

Adapting to Changing Supply Conditions


- In light of improved supply conditions staff are developing recommendations to roll back water use limits and penalties should storage conditions continue to improve further
- Discuss recommendations for the Board's consideration at the January 4th meeting

Drought Outreach

Looking Back on 2021

- February 16: Marin declares a drought and asks all customers to voluntarily conserve water
- April 20: Marin Water declares a water shortage emergency and adopts mandatory water use restrictions, including a 40% district-wide reduction goal
- May 04: Marin Water adopts irrigation restrictions limiting spray irrigation to 2 days/week
- July 06: Marin Water adopts tighter irrigation restrictions limiting spray irrigation to 1 day/week
- July 20: Marin Water adopts landscape restrictions for new service connections prohibiting the installation of new planting
- September 21: Marin Water establishes water use limits and excess use penalties limiting water use to 65 gallons per person per day for single family customers
- October 19: Marin Water adopts a district wide prohibition on winter irrigation (Dec-May) and pool filling

and the warmer and drier weather has created drought conditions throughout much of California. While the district is not in a declared drought, these unusually dry conditions have resulted in our water supply level running about 20% below average for this time of year

weather the winter months will bring, we are asking all of our customers to help us conserve water Making some smart and simple adjustments to your daily routine will make a big difference in saving water Saving water today ensures we have

an adequate supply, should there be dry weather ahead.

Taking shorter showers, turning off the water while brushing your teeth and running your dishwasher and doing laundry only when you have a full load are all water-saving moves. Fixing leaking toilets and faucets will save water, and save you money.

With shorter daylight hours, your plants and garden need far less water. Reducing irrigation times and turning off your system several days a week will make a big difference.

Perhaps the best water-saving move you can make is trading in your

gorgeous landscaping with colorfu blooms that require less water and less time. Marin Water offer: rebates of \$1 for every square foot of lawn replaced. If you replace at least 500-square-feet of lawn, you can choose to have free mulching material and an irrigation conversion kit delivered directly to your home You can learn more about these programs and all of our rebates at MarinWater.org/rebates






Cash for Grass - Thanks for Participating!
