ET'S CUT WATER WASTE

Summer 2022

A water use efficiency specialist with Marin Water recently visited a customer's home. The homeowner had just received a letter regarding a spike in water use the previous billing period, and he wasn't sure what to do.

Our specialist found the customer's irrigation programming was running much longer than necessary, among other issues such as leaks in the drip irrigation system. The result: Thousands of gallons of water saved every year, a reduced monthly bill and one happy customer.

This homeowner's story is fairly typical. As part of Marin Water's Conservation Assistance Program, our specialists help find ways to reduce water waste for a half-dozen customers each week.

A call to our specialists isn't the only way to discover potential water waste. Marin Water advises all customers to take the time to audit your own

irrigation systems, checking sprinkler and drip systems to ensure they are working correctly. Also, customers are welcome to stop by our Corte Madera office at 220 Nellen Ave., during regular business hours, to pick up free water efficiency upgrades, such as faucet aerators or replacement showerheads. 

Protecting Our Natural Resources

The ability to deliver clean, reliable water to 191,000 southern Marin County residents is our top priority. Nowhere is that mission more evident than in the work the District does to care for the Mount Tamalpais Watershed where we source more than half of our water for our customers. Great effort goes into protecting our natural resources there from threats, including the impacts of wildfires.

And among the forested hillsides of the Mount Tamalpais Watershed, small vegetation fires are common, especially during fire season. Wildfire has the potential to degrade forests and watershed functions that could impact water quality and water supply infrastructure as well as threaten neighboring residential communities.

Through detailed planning, comprehensive training and robust vegetation management and forest restoration efforts, Marin Water works year—round to minimize the impacts of potential wildfires and maximize ecological health on our watershed lands – all of which help to protect water quality, our water delivery infrastructure and the community.

Planning and Collaborative Partnerships

As climate change continues to impact weather patterns, environmental conditions and fire behavior, Marin Water works to ensure a strong understanding of existing conditions on the watershed, including the watershed's wildfire resilience, which was most recently detailed in the 2021 Wildfire Resilience Study. This study is a living document that presents a comprehensive review of the current state of the District's wildfire preparedness programs and operations.

In addition, staff work closely with numerous partners to coordinate on fire resiliency and response on the watershed. The District takes part in bimonthly Fire Safe Marin Board meetings and engages with the Advisory Technical Committee for the Marin Wildfire Prevention Authority.

The District is also a member of One Tam, a multi-agency partnership that will soon publish a Forest Health Strategy planning document outlining guidance to ensuring Marin's forests remain resilient in the face of looming threats from wildfire, invasive species and disease.

Lagunitas Creek Restoration Project gets boost from federal grant



A Marin Water effort to protect Coho salmon and steelhead trout populations received a significant b last month, earning a U.S. Bureau of Reclamation WaterSMART grant to enhance spawning habitat with a laquists Creek watershed

The \$1.4 million grant is the first WaterSMART grant Marin Water has earned, and it will ensure wor first phase of the restoration project can be completed at key parts of Lagunitas Creek.

Due in part to a series of dans throughout the 83-square-mile Lagunitas Creek Watershed, critical so habitat for Colon salmon and steelhead trout has been reduced over time. The restoration program envisioned by Marin Water would install wood structures and add gravel habitat at sites along Lagun Creek to enhance resiliency of aquatic wildlife in the watershed.

The district has received nearly \$1.2 million thus far from the California Department of Fish and Wild advance the engineering, designs and environmental review for this work. The total construction cost restoration effort is estimated at \$7.5 million and is expected to begin in 2024.


The Marin Water Board of Directors created new guidelines in March to prohibit the instillation of new decorative lawns in commercial areas.

"The board's decision is intended to discourage new installations of purely decorative grass around business complexes and in street medians by restricting use of the District's potable and recycled water supplies for grass care and maintenance," Marin Water said in a press release.



It took just two days for Maintenance Worker II Darrell Nickerson to answer our Fisheries Program team's call for a safer route to the Marin Water fish trap near Point Reyes Station. Nickerson's Sky Oaks Maintenance Department procured temporary stairways, which are removable to prevent damage during winter floods, making the path to the creek much safer!



A super team from multiple departments led the first cleanout of the clarifier's at San Geronimo Treatment Plant in more than a decade. Chris acted quickly, calling his supervisor and working with a technician to get the meter running again within six hours before eventually helping to replace the unit and bring it into the district's ever-expanding network of smart meters.

UPDATE: 6/16/22 @ 11:30 a.m.: A small grass fire that led to the closure of the Mt. Tamalpais Watershed on Thursday morning was safely put out by area fire agencies, allowing much of the watershed to reopen to visitors before noon.

The vegetation fire started about 9:30 a.m. near Bon Tempe Lake, prompting quick evacuations as firefighters from the Marin County and Ross Valley fire departments, among others, responded to quickly get the fire under control.

In all. 1.89 acres were burned.

Visitors were still advised to avoid the Bon Tempe Lake area of the watershed, as crews remained on scene for minor mop up operations. Marin Water wishes to thank firefighting personnel, as well as our own Watershed Rangers, for their quick work with today's fire.

ORIGINAL MESSAGE: The Mt. Tamalpais Watershed is closed until further notice, as ground and air firefighting resources responded Thursday morning to a small, one-acre grass fire with visible smoke near Bon Tempe Lake.

Visitors to the area were quickly evacuated, making way for firefighters from the Marin County Fire Department, Ross Valley Fire Department and trained wildland firefighters from Marin Water. The fire, which ignited about 9:30 a.m. Thursday, has led to the closure of the entire Mt. Tam watershed out of an abundance of caution. Due to resources being focused on the fire, Marin Water is asking visitors to avoid traveling to the area.


